

# Pennsylvania TANF & CCDF Spending: Quarterly Update

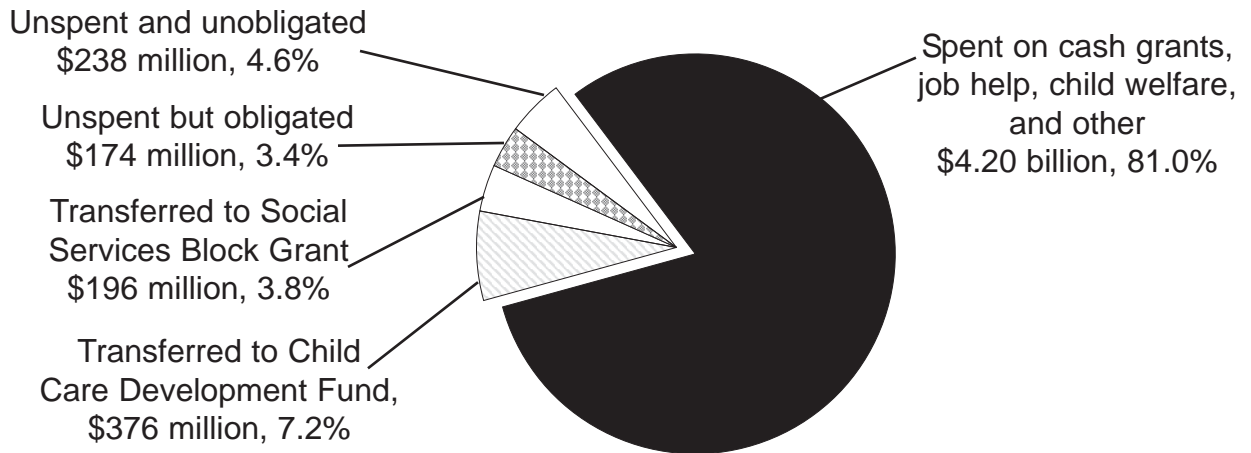

## In March 2004, 169,529 Pennsylvania children were receiving TANF

From the beginning of Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) in March 1997 through March 2004, Pennsylvania has not spent \$412 million of its total TANF award. However, \$174 million of that has been obligated for future spending.

**Total TANF federal dollars to Pennsylvania: \$5.18 billion**



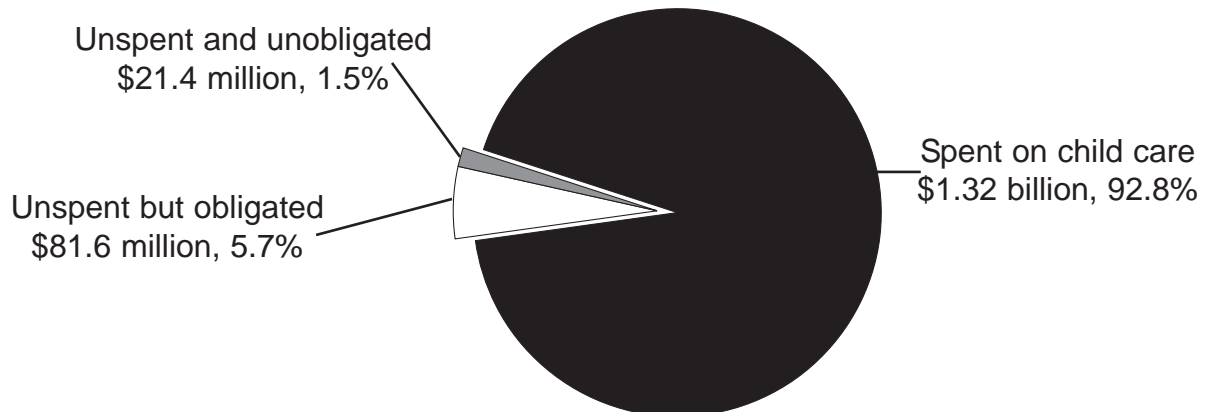
### PA Child Care Development Fund spending as of March 31, 2004\*\*

**Total CCDF federal dollars to Pennsylvania: \$1.05 billion**

**Transferred from TANF to CCDF: \$376 million**

**Total dollars available for CCDF: \$1.42 billion**

**Unspent and unobligated: \$21.4 million**
