Poverty

The impact of hardship

On this page: Poverty by child's age, family, and neighborhood.

- Children in poverty can face insurmountable barriers to success. They are likelier to suffer abuse or neglect. Their school performance is hampered by the greater likelihood of learning disabilities, repeating grades, and dropping out. They are likelier to become teen parents and to abuse drugs and alcohol.
- Younger children are especially vulnerable to poverty. They are likelier to die in infancy or early childhood, be hospitalized, go hungry, see conflicts in the home and violence in the neighborhood, and experience learning delays.
- Neighborhood concentration of poverty can expose children to crime, violence, and lead poisoning and other health hazards. Children may have less access to beneficial activities that offer recreation, learning, and socialization.
