Lives still hardship for many

One Beaver County child in three lives in a low-income family and relies on the state or federal government for health coverage, according to The State of the Child in Pennsylvania 2004 report.

The report was released today by Pennsylvania Partnerships for Children, a nonpartisan organization that works to maintain the health, education and well-being of the state's children.

The report is issued every two years and relies on indicators such as family income, age and education of the mother, and cases of abuse and neglect to measure the welfare of children across the state.

The information is then passed on to policymakers and residents in the hope that community and school programs will be changed and improved to fit their needs.

The county's statistics are comparable, and many are superior, to statistics from across the state.

For example, Beaver County scored better than the state average in the number of mothers who received prenatal care, the number of mothers who had completed high school and in the infant mortality rate. And Beaver County has the same rate of children living in low-income families and relying on government for health coverage as the majority of Pennsylvania counties.

However, Beaver County did score slightly worse than average in a handful of categories, including the number of mothers who use tobacco during pregnancy (one in four) and the number of children who have both parents in the workforce (seven in 10).
