On this page: Employment status, by high school-age residents, parents of children under age 18, and parents of young children under age 6.

- Teens who are not in school and not working may face bleak prospects for the future. At a time when critical life decisions are made, unemployment can herald future difficulty in getting and keeping a job.
- Parental employment indicates parents' ability to provide for their children. Without it, children lack health benefits and endure irregular daily routines. Single parents and parents of younger children face particularly daunting daily challenges finding quality, safe child care.
