

What's at Stake for Kids if the ACA is Repealed?

With the health care debate gaining momentum in Washington, too much is at stake if a high-quality replacement plan for the Affordable Care Act (ACA) is not immediately available

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The ACA has improved the quality of life for Pennsylvania families

- ✓ Protects children with pre-existing medical conditions
- ✓ Prohibits the establishment of lifetime limits on coverage or limiting or denying children's coverage

Did you know? Before implementation of the ACA, children could have been denied coverage or charged a high price if they needed individual market coverage

✓ Allows young adults – including youth who "age out" of the foster care system at 18 – to remain on a parent's health insurance plan to receive coverage through Medicaid until age 26

Did you know? Without this provision, an estimated 89,000 young adults in PA could lose health care coverage

✓ Prevents families from being charged co-pays for preventive medical services (immunizations, hearing tests and behavioral health assessments including autism or depression screenings)

Did you know? Before the ACA, families could face high co-pays making preventive services financially out of reach for their kids

✓ Streamlined the process for Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) and Medicaid eligibility determination and renewal, helping to connect more children with coverage

Did you know? Thanks to the ACA, verifying eligibility for programs like CHIP or Medicaid can happen immediately or overnight and renewals can happen automatically

Children in every community rely on the ACA, CHIP and Medicaid for coverage

✓ The ACA gave states the opportunity to expand coverage through Medicaid. PA joined more than 30 other states in doing so, giving more than 131,000 PA parents the opportunity to enroll in coverage for themselves as they enrolled their eligible children

Did you know? PA's rate of uninsured kids declined to an all-time low of 4.1%, in part due to the Medicaid expansion

✓ CHIP & Medicaid are funded through a state-federal partnership

Did you know? The federal government funds: 90% of Medicaid expansion costs; more than 50% of the cost for other Medicaid beneficiaries; and nearly 90% of the cost of CHIP

- ✓ More than 40% of PA children are covered through CHIP and Medicaid (see chart)
 - o CHIP \rightarrow More than 167,000 children enrolled as of November 2016 o Medicaid \rightarrow 1.1 million children enrolled as of January 2017

Did you know? Possible changes to these programs, such as federal funding caps or a block grant, may pit kids against the disabled, seniors or even their parents

Keeping Pennsylvania's children at the forefront during health care reform discussions

✓ Pennsylvania cannot pick up the cost of reduced federal share. In any repeal or reform efforts, PA's congressional delegation must prioritize and protect the well-being of our most vulnerable citizens
