DEMOGRAPHICS

Population of Children Under Age 18

The number of children birth through age 17 and their reported race and ethnicity (Hispanic or Latino), as issued by the U.S. Census Bureau. The "Other Races" category includes American Indian and Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, and Some Other Race (as reported to the U.S. Census Bureau). Race categories (excluding ethnicity) may not add to 100 due to rounding.

Percentage of Children Under Age 18 Living in Low-Income Families

The percentage of children birth through age 17 who live in families with incomes below 200 percent of the U.S. poverty threshold, as issued by the U.S. Census Bureau. The federal poverty definition consists of a series of thresholds based on family size and composition and is updated every year to account for inflation. In calendar year 2015, a family of two adults and two children fell in the "low-income" category if their annual income fell below \$48,500. The data are based on income received in the 12 months prior to the survey. Small area regional rates were used for the 27 smallest counties not included in the ACS.

Percentage of Uninsured Children Under Age 18

The percentage of children birth through age 17 not covered by any health insurance. The data are based on health insurance coverage at the time of the survey; interviews are conducted throughout the calendar year. Small area regional rates were used for the 27 smallest counties not included in the ACS.

The number of children birth through age 18 participating in Medicaid (MA) divided by the population of children birth through age 18, as estimated by the Pennsylvania State Data Center.

Percentage of Children Age 3-4 in Publicly Funded, High-Quality Pre-Kindergarten

This measure originated from "A Smart Choice for a Solid Start: The Case for Pre-k in PA" report and was most recently updated with "A Path Forward: Publicly Funded, High-Quality Pre-K in Pennsylvania". The percentage is derived by dividing the number of children age three and four participating in high-quality, publicly funded pre-kindergarten programs by the population of children age three and four, as issued by the U.S. Census Bureau. Publicly-funded pre-kindergarten includes federal and state-funded Head Start, school district pre-kindergarten, Child Care Works enrollments in Keystone STARS 3 and 4 facilities and PA Pre-K Counts.

Percentage of Unserved Children Eligible for Publicly Funded, High-Quality Pre-K

This measure originated from "A Smart Choice for a Solid Start: The Case for Pre-k in PA" report and was most recently updated with "A Path Forward: Publicly Funded, High-Quality Pre-K in Pennsylvania". The percentage of children ages three to four who were not enrolled in Head Start (federal- and state-funded), school district pre-kindergarten, Child Care Works in Keystone STARS 3 and 4 facilities or PA Pre-K Counts and who live in families with incomes below 300 percent of the U.S. poverty threshold. The pre-kindergarten eligibility threshold is 300 percent. Due to small sample size, regional rates were used for the 27 smallest counties.

Children Receiving In-Home Services

This measure is pulled from the 2017 State of Child Welfare dataset. The rate is derived by dividing the unduplicated total number of children in substitute or out-of-home care by the population birth through age 20, as issued by the U.S. Census Bureau.

The percentage of youth age 13 and older living in restrictive placement settings, such as group homes and institutions, on the last day of the reporting period.

Percentage of Children Re-Entering Foster Care Placement

This measure is pulled from the 2017 State of Child Welfare dataset. The percentage of all children who were discharged to reunification with their parents or other relatives before their 18th birthday in a 12-month period, and subsequently re-entered foster care in less than 12 months following their reunification. Young adults up to age 21 are counted as a re-entry if the initial discharge was before they turned 18, and reunified with their parents or other relatives.

Enrollment

The number of students enrolled in and attending publicly funded schools as of October 1, 2015 as reported by school districts, area vocational-technical schools and charter schools.

Poverty

The percentage of children ages 6-17 that live with families earning less than 185 percent of poverty, as issued by the U.S. Census Bureau. The Basic Education Funding Formula enacted in 2016 includes student-based factors on the percent of children in acute poverty (0-99%), poverty (100-184%) and concentrated poverty ($\geq 30\%$ living in acute poverty).

Proficiency

The percentage of public school students who met the proficient level as measured by the Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA). Proficiency levels are provided for third grade students in English Language Arts and eighth grade students in Math.

Four-Year Cohort Graduation Rate

The number of on-time graduates divided by the number of first-time entering ninth grade students who entered four years earlier. Adjustments each year for students who transfer in and out are included in the calculation. A rate is determined for all public high schools, comprehensive career and technical centers and charter schools that graduate students from twelfth grade.

The total funds needed for the school district to reach adequate funding under the state funding formula, as calculated by the Public Interest Law Center.
