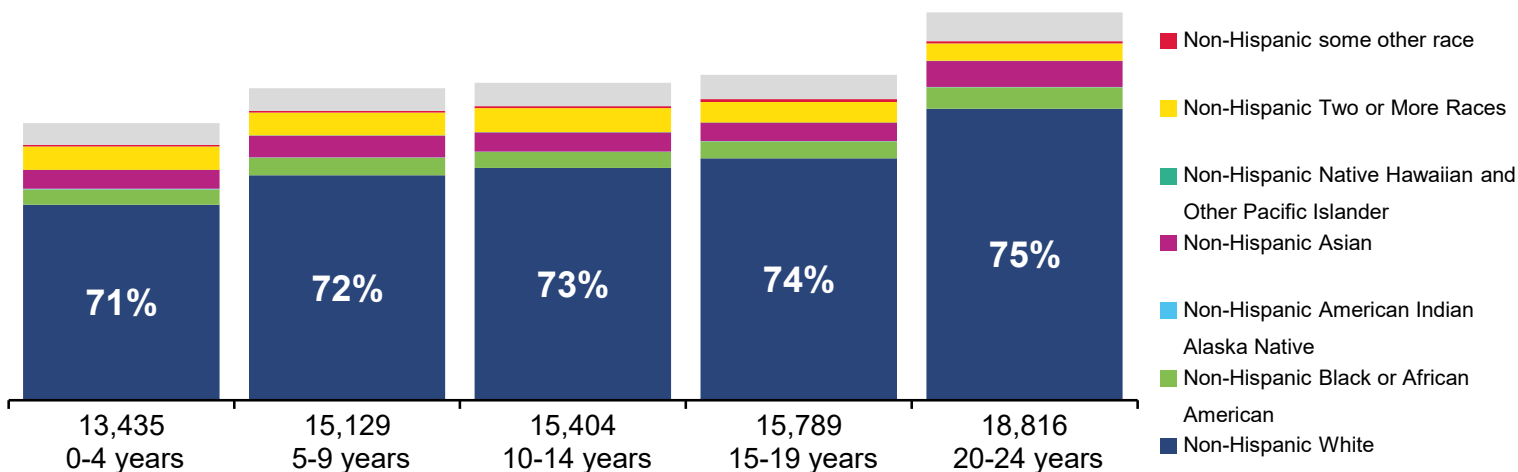

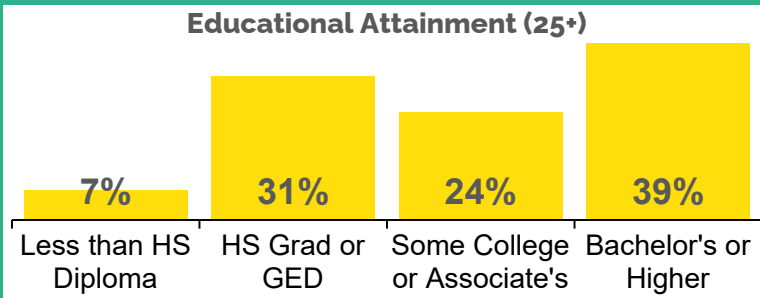

CHILD WELFARE

BLACK CHILDREN, HISPANIC CHILDREN AND CHILDREN OF MULTIPLE RACES have disproportionately higher rates of CPS referrals, including substantiations and valid GPS allegations

263 children and youth served in the foster care system

3 IN 4 children and youth in foster care placed in congregate care settings

1 IN 3 children and youth in foster care are placed with kin

2 IN 5 children entering foster care were reunified with their parents or kin within 12 months

EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION

637 children enrolled in publicly funded, high-quality pre-k; yet 1,803 eligible children remain unserved

90 more classrooms are needed to serve all eligible pre-k children

79% of infants and toddlers eligible for the subsidized Child Care Works program remain unserved

54% of children under age 5 in Child Care Works are in high-quality care

43% of child care capacity for children under 5 is high-quality

HOME VISITING

6% of low-income families who could benefit the most receive evidence-based home visiting services

283 families receive evidence-based home visiting services

K-12 EDUCATION

More than 38,990 enrolled students in 9 school district(s) within the county

39% of school district students are economically disadvantaged

60% of 3rd graders score proficient or advanced in English Language Arts as measured by the Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA)

27% of 8th graders score proficient or advanced in math as measured by the PSSA

1,836 students enrolled in career and technical education

PERINATAL AND CHILDREN'S HEALTH

5% of children under 19 have no health insurance

37% of all children in the county are enrolled in Medicaid or CHIP coverage

871 children in the county enrolled in health coverage through Pennie™, the state's health insurance marketplace

456 infants and toddlers receive services through Early Intervention Part C

71% of eligible infants, young children and women participate in the Pennsylvania WIC program
