



### **CHILD WELFARE**

**BLACK CHILDREN** have disproportionately higher rates of CPS referrals

**BLACK CHILDREN AND HISPANIC CHILDREN** have disproportionately higher substantiation rates

**BLACK CHILDREN** AND CHILDREN OF **MULTIPLE RACES** 

have disproportionately higher rates of valid **GPS** allegations

children and youth in foster care are placed with kin

foster care were reunified with their parents or kin within 12 months

# **EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION**

eligible children remain unserved

more classrooms are needed to serve all eligible pre-k children
