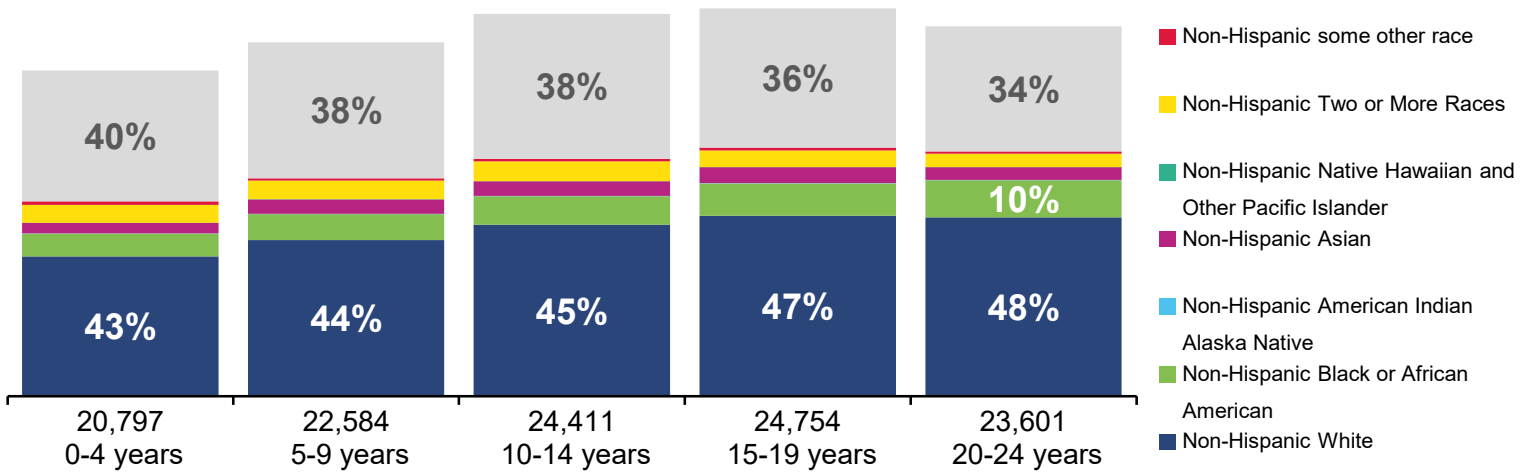

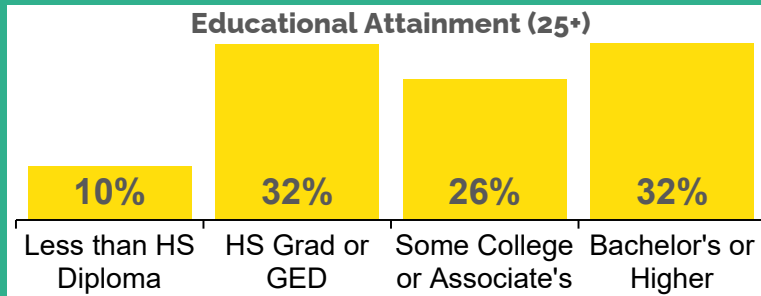

CHILD WELFARE

**BLACK CHILDREN AND HISPANIC CHILDREN** have disproportionately higher rates of CPS referrals, including substantiations and valid GPS allegations

**443** children and youth served in the foster care system

**1 IN 9** children and youth in foster care placed in congregate care settings

**1 IN 2** children and youth in foster care are placed with kin

**1 IN 3** children entering foster care were reunified with their parents or kin within 12 months

EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION

**2,021** children enrolled in publicly funded, high-quality pre-k; yet **3,129** eligible children remain unserved

**156** more classrooms are needed to serve all eligible pre-k children

**69%** of infants and toddlers eligible for the subsidized Child Care Works program remain unserved

**40%** of children under age 5 in Child Care Works are in high-quality care

**47%** of child care capacity for children under 5 is high-quality

HOME VISITING

**5%** of low-income families who could benefit the most receive evidence-based home visiting services

**493** families receive evidence-based home visiting services

**4-40** members served in the Medical Assistance Maternal Home Visiting Program

K-12 EDUCATION

More than **60,520** enrolled students in **10** school district(s) within the county

**52%** of school district students are economically disadvantaged

**49%** of 3rd graders score proficient or advanced in English Language Arts as measured by the Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA)

**21%** of 8th graders score proficient or advanced in math as measured by the PSSA

**2,977** students enrolled in career and technical education

PERINATAL AND CHILDREN'S HEALTH

**3%** of children under 19 have no health insurance

**54%** of all children in the county are enrolled in Medicaid or CHIP coverage

**861** children in the county enrolled in health coverage through Pennie™, the state's health insurance marketplace

**2,021** infants and toddlers receive services through Early Intervention Part C

**67%** of eligible infants, young children and women participate in the Pennsylvania WIC program
